There will be a special opportunity for **4-H Cloverbuds** at the Smith County Free Fair in 2025! The “**Cloverbud Show and Share**” event will take place on Friday, July 18, from 12:30-1:00 p.m. in the Armory. This is an excellent opportunity for each Cloverbud member to get involved in the fair experience.

The “**Cloverbud Show and Share**” will be a non-competitive event in which Cloverbuds are given the opportunity to showcase one activity that they have completed through the 4-H Youth Development program, sharing about all that they have learned along the way. Cloverbuds will be required to pre-register for the event, like any 4-H member wishing to participate at the fair.

Cloverbuds are a part of the 4-H Youth Development Program in Smith County. However, they can enter in the “**Cloverbud Show and Share**” scheduled during the Smith County Free Fair. If a parent chooses, Cloverbuds may compete in Open Class events, which are implemented entirely by the fair board and not by K-State Research and Extension. This model protects the educational and development focus of the 4-H Cloverbud Program, ensuring that their involvement is only in age-appropriate activities. Members must be 9 years of age before January 1 of the current year and must not have passed their 19th birthday before January 1 of the current year. Exhibitors are expected to be enrolled in the project area in which they are entering at the Kansas State Fair and to have exhibited in that division at their local fair to bring to the State Fair.

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FORWARD

This fair is dedicated to every citizen of Smith County and is conducted for your education and pleasure.

To raise the standard of all products of Smith County is our goal. We are asking every citizen to do his or her part by making exhibits in all classes possible. This is your fair.

GENERAL RULES

Rule I - Interpretations, Amendments, and Violations.

Section 1—The Executive Committee of the Smith County Fair Association reserves the right to interpret these rules and regulations and arbitrarily settle all questions arising in connection with the Fair that shall be held under the management of this Board.

Section 2 – The Executive Committee reserves the right to amend or add to these rules as they, in their judgment, deem it advisable. In the event of a conflict of general and special rules, the latter will govern.

Section 3 –Any person who violates any general or special rule will forfeit all privileges and premiums.

Section 4 –In case there is not sufficient premium money to pay all premiums in full, money will be prorated.

Section 5 –Fair Board can meet, vote and make changes at the fair as needed in executive session. The number of Executive Board members present must be one over majority.

Rule II - Entry Requirements

Section 1—All entries to the Smith County Free Fair are free but no unworthy entry will be received for exhibit.

Section 2—All property of any character entered at the Fair for any purpose shall be subject to the control of the Superintendent in charge.

Rule III - Exhibitor: Duties and Privileges

Section 1—Any individual from Smith County or surrounding counties may exhibit in open class competition but only members of Smith County 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters may exhibit in 4-H and FFA competition. Smith County 4-H Clubs, FFA Chapters and open class exhibitors shall have priority over non-residents for exhibit space.

Section 2—If it is ascertained that any exhibitor has or caused to be made any false statement in regard to any exhibit or if any exhibitor shall attempt to interfere with the judges in the performing of their duties, he shall be excluded from all competition or exhibition on the grounds of the Fair Association and any awards that he may have received may be forfeited at the discretion of the Board.

Section 3—The decision of the judges shall be final.

Rule IV - Power and Liabilities of the Fair Association

Section 1—The management will use every precaution to guard against extortion in any form on the Fairgrounds and any violation of this rule shall result in forfeit of every privilege, contract on money paid in and expulsion from the grounds.

Section 2—The management reserves the right to remove from the grounds any exhibit, animal, concession, or show that may be falsely entered, or may be deemed unsuitable or objectionable, or to remove any sign, banner, identification mark or signature or advertising matter of any kind which may be deemed objectionable.

Section 3—No diseased animal or fowl will be permitted to be exhibited or occupy space at the Fair and every precaution will be taken to enforce this rule. However, the management will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may be sustained by anyone through violation of this rule.

Section 4—No claim for an injury to any person or property shall be asserted or suit instituted or maintained against the Fair Association, its officers or agents, corporation or firms as a result of damage sustained on the ground at this fair.

Rule V - Awards

Section 1—Premiums will be paid on the first, second and third place exhibits in each class in Open Class. Only one first place, one second, and one third place ribbon stickers will be given per open class. All other entries in the class will receive a participation ribbon sticker.

Section 2— It will be left to the discretion of the Superintendent to have the judge award a champion and reserve champion in the open class division.

Section 3—No ribbon will be awarded on articles not mentioned in this catalog.

Section 4—Classes will be judged according to quality of entries in that class. Trophies and ribbons will be awarded accordingly. Single entries do not necessarily merit championship or blue ribbon placing.

Section 5—Each superintendent will be responsible for putting the information on the Board of Champions for their department.

Rule VI - Miscellaneous

Section 1 – All rights that are applicable shall be made a part of all contracts made with concessionaires.

Section 2 – A Superintendent will be appointed for each department, whose duty it shall be to receive exhibits, properly classify them, and assist the judges. Assistant and Junior Superintendents will assist.

Section 3— All entries shall be exhibited by using a two section exhibit card. Exhibit cards are available from the District Extension Office, Courthouse, Smith Center, KS. One entry card is necessary for each exhibit. Pre-entry will be made two weeks prior to the start of the Fair at the Smith County Extension Office according to department rules.

Section 4 – Livestock exhibitors shall be required to keep their livestock stalled and uncovered from 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. daily.

Section 5 – No alcoholic beverages or smoking allowed on the fairgrounds. Signs will be posted.

Section 6 – There will be a \$75.00 camper fee for the week during the fair.

ATTENTION ALL LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS

The fair is an educational display open to the public, so that the viewing public may have a good experience at our fair. The fair board is asking for your cooperation in making the livestock exhibit area attractive.

The fair board requests that between **6:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m.** there be no cleaning of stalls or washing of animals in any wash rack area. Stalls and animals must be clean and presentable before **6:00 p.m.** when the public begins to arrive.

We want the fair to be a showcase of excellence and we appreciate your cooperation in this matter.

NOTICE:

The livestock sale committee will not be responsible for selling any livestock that do not meet the current market weights. The weights will be posted on the first day of the Fair and under each different species in the fair book.

Caring for the life of an animal is a serious responsibility of 4-H and FFA members. All animals or livestock shown housed and displayed at the Smith County Free Fair shall receive care that is healthful, consistent with accepted husbandry practices, and with the rules and regulations set by the Smith County Free Fair Board. This includes keeping the pens of your livestock in a presentable manner and a safe and comfortable location for your project while at the fair.

Each pen of livestock will be inspected by the superintendents at checkout time. If the pens are unsatisfactorily cleaned upon removal of the livestock, **SALE PREMIUMS WILL BE WITHHELD.**

WITHDRAWAL TIMES FOR DRUGS, GROWTH PROMOTANTS AND OTHER APPROVED MATERIALS: 4-H and FFA members, their parents, project leaders, club leaders, and FFA Advisors have a serious responsibility to use animal health aid (drugs), growth promotants and other approved materials with great care, and only when needed in correct amounts. Approved withdrawal times are set and must be followed to assure that meat customers receive wholesome food products.

LIVESTOCK HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

GENERAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS (In the State of Kansas)

***No health papers are required for animals residing in Kansas.** Upon arrival a check point will be visibly located on the west side of fairgrounds by the horse arena. All animals must be checked prior to unloading. Early arriving livestock must also be vet-checked with the signed entry card posted in the animal stalls. A veterinarian will inspect each animal for infectious diseases such as club lamb fungus, sore mouth, warts and /or ringworm. Animals found to have any of these conditions will be dismissed from the fairgrounds. To speed this process, we ask that all lambs be slick shorn prior to arrival. These steps are intended to protect, not inconvenience, exhibitors. All animals need to be individually identified by tattoo, metal ear tag, 4-H or FFA ear tag, or breed registration number. Animals with active lesions of ringworm, multiple warts visible without close examination, or infected with mange, as determined by the department superintendent(s) will not be permitted to exhibit. All required tests must have been conducted in a state approved laboratory. All animals are subject to examination by officials designated by the fair board, and shall be free of clinical signs of infectious or contagious disease.

Please have entry cards ready to hand to vet.

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS:

- It is recommended that all animals be subject to examination by the exhibition staff or their representatives and shall be free of clinical signs of infectious or contagious disease.
- It is recommended that animals determined by exhibition staff to have not met listed requirements and recommendations will not be permitted to exhibit.
- **Certificate Of Veterinary Inspection (Health Certificate)**
 - **Kansas Origin Livestock** – Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is not required by Kansas Department of Agriculture – Division of Animal Health (KDA-DAH), but can be required at the discretion of each exhibition event.
 - **Livestock Originating From Other States** – All livestock originating outside of Kansas must meet Kansas import requirements and must have a valid Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

CATTLE (BEEF, DAIRY) AND BISON:

- All cattle and bison must meet the General Requirements.
- It is recommended that cattle determined by exhibition staff to have lesions of ringworm, warts or infested with mange will not be permitted to exhibit.
- **Cattle Originating From Other States**
 - All cattle must have official ID, and ID must be individually listed on the accompanying CVI.
 - All dairy cattle require an import permit.
 - All lactating dairy cattle must have negative HPAI milk test within 7 days of movement.

GOATS:

- In addition to the General Requirements, all goats must be:
 - Identified with a registered tattoo or an official USDA premises ID tag (Scrapie tag.) Goats identified with registration tattoos must have legible tattoos and must have registration papers for these animals available for inspection.
 - It is recommended that all goats are free of any signs of sore mouth and clinical signs of active fungal (ringworm) infection.
- **Goats Originating From Other States**
 - All goats must have official ID, and ID must be individually listed on the accompanying CVI.

HORSES:

- All horses must meet the General Requirements.
- **Kansas Origin Horses** – A valid VS Form 10-11 showing evidence of a negative Equine Infectious Anemia (Coggins) test conducted by a state-approved laboratory within 12 months prior to exhibition **is required by KDA-DAH**. Foals six months of age and younger, accompanying their EIA-negative dams, are exempt from EIA test requirements.
- **Horses Originating From Other States** must be accompanied by a valid VS Form 10-11 showing evidence of a negative Equine Infectious Anemia (Coggins) test conducted by a state-approved laboratory within 12 months prior to entry into Kansas. Foals six months of age and younger, accompanying their EIA-negative dams, are exempt from EIA test requirements.

POULTRY:

- All poultry must meet the General Requirements.
- **Kansas Origin Poultry**
 - Kansas continues its designation as a Pullorum-Typhoid (P-T) Clean state.
 - All poultry (except waterfowl) are required to show proof of being P-T clean by one of the following:
 - Originate from a certified U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid clean flock
 - Test negative at check-in of the county fair when the county has been designated by KDA-DAH for surveillance. Routine surveillance testing will be performed for each county fair a minimum of once every 5 years.
 - **Poultry Originating From Other States** – All poultry (except waterfowl) are required to show proof of being P-T clean by one of the following:
 - Originate from a certified U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid clean flock
 - Test negative on a P-T test within 90 days of exhibition
 - Additionally, out-of-state poultry must have a "Permit to Ship Poultry or Hatching Eggs" issued by the KDA-DAH within the previous year or a permit number issued by the KDA-DAH office within the previous 15 days.

RABBITS:

- All rabbits must meet the General Requirements.
- **Rabbits Originating from other States** - All rabbits originating outside of Kansas must meet Kansas import requirements and must have a valid Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

SHEEP:

- In addition to the General Requirements, all sheep must be:
 - Identified with a registered tattoo or an official USDA premises ID tag (Scrapie tag.) Sheep identified with registration tattoos must have legible tattoos and must have registration papers for these animals available for inspection.
 - It is recommended that all sheep are free of any signs of sore mouth and clinical signs of active fungal (ringworm) infection, including club lamb fungus.
- **Sheep Originating From Other States**
 - All sheep must have official ID, and ID must be individually listed on the accompanying CVI.

SWINE:

- All swine must meet the General Requirements.
- **Swine Originating From Other States** must also meet one of the following:
 - All swine must have official ID, and ID must be individually listed on the accompanying CVI.
 - All swine must obtain an import permit number prior to movement into Kansas.

CATS AND HAND PETS:

All cats must have proof of the distemper vaccination and rabies (for cats 4 mos. and older). The leukemia vaccination will be optional. All dogs showing as hand pets must have proof of current vaccinations. All animals should be free from any disease and in good health.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR THE SMITH COUNTY FREE FAIR ARE THE SAME AS THE KANSAS STATE FAIR SUGGESTS USING. ALL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS WILL BE STRICTLY ENFORCED. THESE RULES ARE FOR YOUR PROTECTION. PLEASE ABIDE BY THEM. THERE WILL BE NO STOCK TANK AT THE FAIR. EXHIBITORS WILL HAVE TO BRING THEIR OWN WATERING EQUIPMENT.

General Livestock Rules and Regulations

1. Read carefully the general information, rules and regulations.
2. Each 4-H member is highly encouraged to have one or more exhibits at the County Fair.
3. Exhibitors must own projects exhibited and must be enrolled in the project phase which the exhibit represents.
4. Exhibits will be placed in champion, blue, red, and white ribbon groups.
5. In classes where there is one exhibit, the judge reserves the right to place the exhibit in the ribbon group they see fit. (Single entries do not necessarily merit trophy or blue ribbon.)
6. Cash prizes will be given to 4-H Leaders for distribution and mailed to FFA Departments for distribution.
7. An entry tag must be filled out and turned in to the superintendent for all livestock exhibits at weigh-in the first day of the Smith County Free Fair.
8. Animals shown in market classes are not eligible to be shown in breeding classes and vice-versa. No livestock shown in breeding classes are eligible to sell in the premium auction.
9. Each exhibitor will be responsible for the feed and care of his animals.
10. Attendance is required of the exhibitor at the pre-fair clean up and set up and at the post fair clean up. Attendance is also required of the exhibitor to work 1 shift (3-4 hrs) at the 4-H Food Stand. Fair premium money/premium auction eligibility will be withheld unless other arrangements are made.
11. The management and superintendent will do their best to provide adequate facilities and protection for exhibits. They are not responsible for damage or loss.
12. The Smith County Free Fair is the official County Fair for Smith County 4-H members, Smith Center FFA and the Thunder Ridge FFA, and members must exhibit here to be eligible for out-of-county competition. You may show in neighboring counties, but cannot put an animal in the Smith County Free Fair premium auction and then show that same animal in another county.
13. The blue/purple exhibits entered in the 4-H Division will be eligible to enter the State Fair in Hutchinson, if a class is available.
14. ALL LIVESTOCK OWNERSHIP IS ENCOURAGED BY MAY 1 AND TAGGED BY JULY 1. Horses are required to have horse I.D. papers in to the Extension Office by July 1 of the current year. Official ear tags are available at weigh-in and at the extension office.
15. Any livestock unloaded the night before will be disqualified.
16. Each pen of livestock will be inspected by the superintendents at the check-out time. If the pens are unsatisfactorily cleaned upon removal of the livestock, **RIBBON AND SALE PREMIUMS WILL BE WITHHELD**. This includes the departments 4-H/FFA Horse, Beef, Sheep, Swine, Poultry, Rabbits, Llama, Bucket Calf, Dairy, Cattle, & Goats.
17. Smith County 4-H/FFA members must show their own livestock. 4-H/FFA members may have another Smith County 4-H/FFA member show their livestock for the following reasons:
 - a. more than 1 animal in the same class.
 - b. injury or illness of the show person determined by the 4-H Grievance Committee fair board executive committee.
 - c. PRIOR approval by the 4-H Grievance Committee fair board executive committee for other extenuating circumstances.
18. All 4-H'ers intending to sell livestock in the auction must contact their superintendent, or sign-up in the barn by 8:00 a.m. on Monday morning. No changes after this time. Strictly enforced!
19. **No alcoholic beverages or smoking allowed on the fairgrounds.** Signs will be posted.
20. All species shows will be no fit shows, "Blow and Show". "No Fit", at the Smith County Free Fair is defined as using no adhesive, glue, paint or powder products.
21. 4-H/FFA member's projects can exhibit unlimited entries in all divisions.
22. Any animal exhibited at the fair registered to a 4-H/FFA member, this same animal may be shown by a child directly related to that 4-H/FFA member. An exhibitor may only collect one premium per animal.
23. All rules questions are to be brought before the extension staff not the Superintendents. Extension staff and Superintendents will enforce rules stated in the fairbook.

Smith County Premium Sale Rules

Sale Procedure:

The Grand Champion in each of the Foods classes will sell first. The Grand Champion and the Reserve Champion animals will sell first. An average will be taken. The blue-ribbon animals will sell next. A blue-ribbon animal can sell for no more than an average of the Grand and Reserve Champions. The top red not more than the average of the blue-ribbon winners. White ribbon animals sell next. The white ribbon animals can sell for no more than the average of the red ribbon winners.

Individuals can sell only one animal or food product.

***Individuals are required to attend setup and cleanup for one hour each and also individuals are required to work 1 shift (3-4 hrs) at the 4-H Food Stand before being eligible to sell their animal or foods exhibit in the Premium Auction.

Three percent of premium on sale of livestock will be withheld and used for fair improvements.

Premium Sale Rules-Executive board has final decision. If a 4-Her will not be able to attend the premium auction they must follow the following protocol. 4-Her must submit a letter to the fair board by 9 a.m. sale morning, and hand deliver a thank you to the buyer.

Sale Order:

2025 – Beef, Meat Goat, Swine, Sheep
2026 – Beef, Swine, Sheep, Meat Goat
2027 – Beef, Sheep, Meat Goat, Swine
2028 – Beef, Meat Goat, Swine, Sheep

The Sale Committee will establish a floor bid on each animal.

The Fair Board considers all sales final between buyer and seller. Any exhibitor wishing to take an animal to another show is encouraged to check the rules governing the show before selling at the Smith County Fair Premium Sale. Some shows do not allow animals to be shown if they have been through a premium, or market auction.

The livestock sale committee will not be responsible for selling any livestock that do not meet the current market weight. The weights will be posted on the first day of the Fair.

DEPARTMENT 1 - HORSE OPEN CLASS

Open kettle processed food and oven canned food will be disqualified. Pickles and sweet spreads must be finished using a water bath process for the altitude of residence. Low acid products must be pressure processed properly for the altitude of residence. 3. Each exhibit must have the complete recipe and instructions with the entry card, or will be lowered one ribbon placing. Recipe must include recipe source, date of publication and altitude of residence.
4. Exhibits must be sealed in clean standard canning jars, with matching brand (use Ball lid on Ball jars, etc.) two-piece lids. Ball and Kerr plaid or fruit decorated or brushed silver lids are permissible, but fancy padded lids, fabric over wraps or cozies interfere with the judging process and should not be used. No fancy packs unless recipe state to do so (ex: Pickled asparagus) Jars must be sealed when entered. Jelly must be in half pints or pint jar. All other products must be in pint or quart jars. Note: There are now 12- ounce

Use of Copyrighted/Trademarked Materials – Applies to Department 19 Booths

In recent years, there has been an increase in the use of brand names, logos, and quotations on exhibits at county and state fairs. Many of these (Olympic rings on banners, candy wrappers on nutrition posters, “Just Do It”, etc.) are copyrighted or trademarked.

Anytime you see the letter “c” with a circle around it the owner of the material holds a copyright. Similarly, all rights to use trademarks are protected by either a “TM” or Letter “t” with a circle around it.

If an individual or group feels that they must use copied material, they should contact the original source, explain how their property will be used, and request written permission so that the material can be used in good faith. The holder may require a user fee. The written permission to use copyrighted and/or trademark material must be attached to the exhibit or displayed if used in a public presentation.

DEPARTMENT 20 -NORTHWEST FFA DISTRICT AG MECHANICS

Rules:

1. Exhibits in this department will be shown out of doors. Displays will consist basically of examples of labor-saving devices and/or examples of farm machinery and equipment constructed, repaired, reconditioned or renovated.
2. All work must have been done by the exhibitor or High School students and in Vocational Agriculture or Agricultural Mechanics Shop classes and exhibited under the school’s name where they were built.
3. All exhibits must be clean and presented in condition for show purposes, and be accompanied by a 8 ½ X 11" sheet containing: exhibitors name and school, description of need, convenience factor, safety features, cost of materials, hours to build, cost of item new, value and labor per hour. Only touch-up will be allowed.
4. All work, except painting must have been done at the Agricultural Education or Agricultural Mechanics school shop. It will be permissible for the exhibitor to take the project home for painting, if necessary. If student needs help in any of the construction or painting of the project, the helper must be another high school student.
5. Any work not done by the exhibitor, including all materials and services that are custom work, and the costs, will be noted at the top of the description page in bold print.
6. Exhibit must have been constructed during the past 2 years.
7. Each entry must have an entry tag, complete with exhibitor’s number.
8. Agricultural Mechanic exhibits will be accepted only from FFA members enrolled in High Schools in the Northwest FFA District of Kansas.
9. Any project that does not meet the above criteria will be shown in open class.
10. **All exhibitors are required to wear the official Smith County Free Fair t-shirt when showing their exhibits. Attendance is required of the exhibitor at the pre-fair clean up and set up and at the post fair clean up and attendance is also required of the exhibitor to work 1 shift (3-4hrs) at the 4-H Food Stand. Fair premium money/premium auction eligibility will be withheld.**

FFA SCHOOL EXHIBIT

1. Display from FFA chapters competing for group awards will consist of four pieces of equipment or machinery, one of which may be a repair job, and will be judged collectively, one group against another, in competing for the chapter award.
2. Not more than two exhibits from one individual may be used to make up the school exhibit.
3. Only pieces of equipment in classes 1-9 (page 39) will be allowed to be part of a school exhibit.

DEPARTMENT 22 -HORSES 4-H/FFA

11. No parent of a participant in the show can be a ring steward.
12. Siblings may show the same horse provided they are not in the same class. If both are in the same age classification, they must decide what classes each will show in.

9. All meat goats must have baby teeth in place with no visible signs of permanent teeth.
10. Goat must be shown with all four feet on the ground. Exhibitors may use a collar, a collar with a short lead, or a halter when showing. Medium/3mm pinch collars will be allowed. During the judge's inspection or handling, all four feet are required to be in contact with the ground.

Rules:

1. Divisions will be determined by age as of January 1. -- SENIORS: 13 AND OVER, JUNIORS: 12 AND UNDER
2. A senior and junior showman will be chosen from the following classes: Beef, Horse, Dairy Cattle, Goats, Sheep, and Swine. These showmen will then compete in the Round Robin.
3. If there is not a champion in a species, that species will not be judged.
4. 1st – 4th places will be named in each of the livestock showmanship classes. The 3rd or 4th may be eligible to participate in the Round Robin if 1st or 2nd are unable.

The Round Robin for the 2025 Smith County Fair consists of the 4-H /FFA specie champions from the individual shows. Currently they are beef, sheep, swine, horse, and goat. Other possibilities will include dairy cattle when available. **Only Grand or Reserve showman can participate in Round Robin. If a member wins multiple species of showmanship they may choose which species to show. If their choice leaves an open species, then the member must show the species which will allow the most members to participate. The executive board has the final decisions in order to get the most participants involved.**

For each specie, all senior contestants from the above breeds will show at once. For example, there will be five steers or heifers from the market and /or breeding classes of the beef show exhibited at once. This example excludes dairy cattle. Each contestant will show their own animal in the species they won and a drawing will be held for the other species.

The judge will determine activities in the showing and appropriate questions. The judge will select the Grand Champion and Reserve Champions at the end of the competition. Upon completion of the individual specie rotation, all animals will remain in place. The juniors will be brought in and they will show the animals in the ring. When the first rotation is over, the Seniors will then bring in the next specie according to the rotation listed below and follow the same procedure.

All livestock exhibited at the Smith County Fair will be eligible for the Round Robin. The judge has the discretion to rotate the individuals in the show ring and score as he/she feels appropriate; provided each specie or rotation is deemed of equal value. When quantity of animals is limited, individuals will have to take turns using the same animal(s) (i.e. dairy cattle, horses, goats).

The animals should be clean. Individual show superintendents will supervise livestock waiting to be shown. Each specie superintendent will be responsible for the selection of the livestock to be used.

The order of specie rotation will be:

1. Swine
2. Beef
3. Horse
4. Sheep
5. Goats
6. Dairy Cattle

Each contestant is required to wear the official Smith County Free Fair t-shirt when participating in the Round Robin Competition.

Post Rock District 4-H Fair Dog Show to be held in Osborne.

DIVISION H – POST ROCK DISTRICT 4-H DOG SHOW

1. All 4-H/FFA General Rules for Post Rock District County Fairs will apply.
2. To be eligible to compete in the Post Rock District 4-H Dog Show, an exhibitor must be enrolled in the appropriate phase of the Dog project. Dogs must be owned July 1.
3. Dogs must be at least 6 months of age for Showmanship and Obedience classes. Dogs must be at least 12 months of age to compete in the Agility class.
4. The Post Rock District 4-H Dog Show will be held **Saturday, June 14 at 9:00 a.m.** at the Osborne County Fairgrounds covered arena.
5. Dogs are to be **in place 30 minutes prior to judging** and are released 30 minutes after judging is completed.

6. Post Rock District 4-H Dog Show pre-entries will be completed through a google document. Entries are due **June 9**. All Post Rock District 4-H members enrolled in the Dog project will be contacted with an email which includes the google document link.
7. Ribbon premium money will be paid to the exhibitor by their respective Post Rock District county.
8. Prizes will be given for Grand Champion Junior Dog Showmanship, Grand Champion Senior Dog Showmanship, Grand Champion Junior Agility, Grand Champion Senior Agility, Grand Champion Junior Obedience and Grand Champion Senior Obedience. Judge will determine the Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion winners based on scores.
9. A volunteer from each Post Rock District county is needed to assist at the dog show, including but not limited to, set up, tear down, records, and awards.
10. The State 4-H Dog Show Immunization Record (only MG-34 Revised, October 2017 accepted) must be completed for each dog entered in the Post Rock District 4-H Dog Show. The record may be printed on any color paper. Originals or photocopies are acceptable. The fully completed form must be presented to the superintendent at check in on the day of the show to be eligible to compete. Teams without the immunization record will not be allowed to show. Required vaccinations include: Bordetella, Distemper, Hepatitis, Parvovirus, Parainfluenza, and Rabies. The rabies vaccination must be administered by a licensed veterinarian. All vaccinations must be current.
11. Any abuse of dogs on grounds, or in the ring, will result in disqualification.
12. No dog in season will be allowed to show.
13. A well-fitting collar of leather, chain, or fabric is to be used for Obedience and Rally Obedience; for Agility, a buckle or snap collar; for Showmanship, a show lead that serves as both collar and lead or a fine link chain collar, a "snake" chain or a fabric slip collar with a narrow, lightweight fabric or leather lead. No spike, pinch, special training collars and hanging objects from collars are allowed.
14. In Obedience, Agility Competition, and Rally Obedience competition, after receiving two qualifying scores (purple or blue) from two different judges, the team must advance to the next level at the start of the next 4-H year.
15. Any dog fouling the ring will receive a white ribbon. Owners should collect all dog waste in plastic bags and put in trash.
16. Baiting dogs is not allowed.
17. No mobile phones and/or other electronic devices are allowed in the ring.
18. Dogs are not allowed to run at large on fairgrounds. Dogs must be kept on leash at all times except when in the obedience class in the ring.
19. The Post Rock District Dog Show will follow rules and scores as listed in the published Kansas 4-H Dog Show Rule Book 4H1120, January 2021.

Showmanship Competition

20. Entries will be judged on the fitting of the dog: clean and well brushed, tone and condition of coat, healthy appearance, teeth, toenails and eyes. -Quality of display material – 30% (Size, style and neatness of lettering, proportion of models and lettering balanced, workmanship, including handouts. If used, charts, models, and lettering used effectively to teach ideas, colorful, artistic, neat and well-balanced.

Twigs and fruit collections may be exhibited in whatever manner you choose. (Maximum exhibit size 3' x 4') Resources for exhibiting are located on the Kansas 4-H forestry project webpage.
2. Name, club, age, and year in project on front cover or in a prominent location.
3. Leaves should be identified with an appropriate label located near the leaf on the same page. Labels should include (1) proper common name as listed in the 4H334 ("List of Native Kansas Trees") (2) Scientific Name (Optional in 2025 and required in 2026) (3) Location (city and or county) where collected; and (4) date (day, month, year) or (month, day, year) collected
4. Divide specimens into two sections: Native Kansas Trees and Non-Native Trees.
(<https://www.bookstore.ksre.ksu.edu/pubs/4H334.pdf>)
5. New specimens are those specimens collected during the current 4-H year and cannot be a duplicate tree species of previously displayed specimens.
6. Group specimens according to the years collected (ex. "old-previous years" and "new")
7. Variations of varieties do not count as different species or specimens.

8. When replacing previously displayed samples, due to degradation, improper mounting or incorrect identification, the specimen label must also be updated. Replacements do not count as new specimens. Replacements should be displayed in the “old previous” section of the display.

(CONT.) DEPARTMENT 39 - FORESTRY 4-H/FFA

9. If you retrieve information for your forestry exhibit, you must include a reference citation to the source.
10. In all leaf collections, exhibit one complete leaf where possible. If leaf is too large, exhibit as much as possible. Sketch in reduced scale the entire leaf and illustrate where the exhibited portion is from. Note: A “leaflet” is incorrect when displayed as the complete leaf for the tree.
11. All work must show originality. Leaf collections and displays should not closely resemble work done by others in the same club.
12. **All exhibitors are required to wear the official Smith County Free Fair t-shirt when showing their exhibits.**
13. **Attendance is required of the exhibitor at the pre-fair clean up and set up and at the post fair clean up. The Exhibitor is required to work 1 shift (3-4 hrs) at the 4-H Food Stand. Fair premium money/premium auction eligibility will be withheld.**
14. If the youth is in their first 2 years of the project, they may enter 235 (Beginning). If they are in their 3rd or 4th year in the project, they may enter class 236 (Intermediate). If they are in their 5th or 6th year in the project they should enter class 236A (Senior). If they are in their 7th or more year in the project enter class 237 (Advanced).
15. Youth of any age may enter 238-243. Youth could enter a maximum of two entries as long as they are in different classes, ex. One from 235-237 and another from 238-243.

Rules:

1. Exhibitor must be enrolled in project to enter this division.
2. Members may have unlimited entries in the department
3. More than 1 entry may be made in each class.
4. All entries must be the work of the exhibitor and must be current year's work.
5. Exhibitors are responsible for packing and unpacking their own exhibits.
6. 4-H'ers should bring their entries at the time they are to be judged.
7. All entries ready for display. i.e. All entries must be ready for display-complete with hangers, wires, etc. or will be lowered on placing.
8. Fine Arts must be framed, matted or both.
9. **All exhibitors are required to wear the official Smith County Free Fair t-shirt when showing their exhibits.**
10. **Attendance is required of the exhibitor at the pre-fair clean up and set up and at the post fair clean up. The Exhibitor is also required to work 1 shift (3-4 hrs) at the 4-H Food Stand. Fair premium money/premium auction eligibility will be withheld.**
11. The grand champion in each of the 5 Visual Arts Divisions will be able to go to state. The 5 divisions are Fine Arts, Clay and Ceramics, Leather and Jewelry, Three-Dimensional, and General Crafts. A MEMBER MAY ONLY TAKE 1 ITEM TO THE STATE FAIR.

Fine Arts- oil, chalk, charcoal, dyes, pastels, pencil, ink, acrylic, or watercolor on canvas, canvas board, paper, wood, metal, or textiles, framed as a picture, prepared for hanging, stretched canvas art on a wood frame is considered prepared for hanging provided that frame has a hanger. Clay and Ceramics – Any original item of clay; may be fired or unfired, hand formed, or thrown on a wheel. Self-hardening, fire/oven cured, and/or cornstarch clays are acceptable. Items can include, but not limited to clay statues, bowls, etc. Leather and Jewelry – Any leather stamped, carving, tooling, lacing, or stitching piece or any jewelry piece made from any medium are acceptable exhibits. Three-Dimensional – The piece must be observable on at least 3 sides and should be either free-standing or prepared to be hung. Craft and pre-formed or assembled projects are not acceptable. General Crafts - This category incorporates miscellaneous pieces that do not correspond to the four, above-mentioned categories.

COPYRIGHT ** Kits and preformed molds are not considered original and are not acceptable in any Visual Arts Class. Combining parts of different patterns (pictures, photographs, images from the internet or a magazine) with the members own ideas can result in original design, but simply changing the color, pattern, and/or size of a pattern does not make the design original. IF you create a replica of what you see somewhere else (i.e. Pinterest), it is not your original design. If a photo, sketch, or other idea source was used, submit it with your entry, firmly attached to your exhibit.

It may include samples of techniques, how-tos, photographs of completed projects, or other ways of educating others about fiber arts.
NOTE: A collection of brochures, web pages, patterns, record book forms, etc. does not constitute an educational notebook. Follow copyright laws as explained in the General Rules as you are preparing your exhibit. Name, local unit and fiber art covered must be clearly marked in the notebook.

Rules:

1. For food safety purposes, any entries with frostings and fillings must calculate the amount of sugar in the frosting/filling recipe only. The calculation must be attached to entry, or the placing will be lowered one ribbon when judged. Frosting and fillings need to contain more than 65% sugar for safety. Examples on how to calculate this percentage are included in the publication located at: <https://bookstore.ksre.ksu.edu/pubs/MF3544.pdf>. A worksheet is available at: <https://bookstore.ksre.ksu.edu/item/frostings-and-fillings-worksheet-4H1171>
2. Food Safety Guidelines should be followed. "Food Safety Recommendations for Acceptable Fair Exhibits" publication is available at the Extension Office

3. For food safety purposes, any food with custard and dairy-based fillings and frostings (ex. Cream cheese regardless of sugar content) raw eggs, flavored oils, "canned" bread or cakes in a jar, cut fresh fruit or any food requiring refrigeration (ex. Bacon) will be disqualified and not judged. Refer to K-State Research and Extension publication, 4-H888, Judge's Guide for Food and Nutrition Exhibits, for information to help you make informed, safe food exhibit decisions.

CONT. DEPARTMENT 41 - FOODS & NUTRITION 4-H

4. Alcohol (ex. Wine, beer and hard liquor) is not allowed as an ingredient in food entries. Entries with alcohol in the recipe will be disqualified and not be judged.
5. Unlimited entries in classes 290-301A, and unlimited entries in classes 310-333.
6. Place entire baked product on a **heavy** paper plate or cardboard not more than 1" larger than the product. **(Please do not use glass or metal pans) Exhibit will be lowered one ribbon place if not exhibited properly.**
Use the following guidelines for exhibiting each type of food as follows:
***Cookies, muffins, biscuits, rolls, etc.** - 3 samples, same shape, same recipe (exhibitors may use any type, flavor, or kind of baked product in these categories). No muffin paper on muffins.
***Cakes/Coffee Cake** - Include whole cake, may be 1 or more layers, frosted or unfrosted, any flavor.
***Pie** - Exhibit whole pie. Custard and cream pies are not acceptable for food safety reasons.
7. **Each entry should be placed in a plastic bag.**
8. Cakes may be made from your favorite recipe or commercial mix.
9. All unfrosted cakes shall be exhibited in an upright position with top crust showing, except for those cakes made with special designs such as Bundt cakes.
10. **Recipes are required.** Exhibit will be placed 1 ribbon lower if there is no recipe or rules are not followed.
11. Microwave/convection baked foods are acceptable in all classes. 4-H'ers should also tell judge that the product was prepared in a microwave or convection oven.
12. Products will be sold to the public after judging.
13. In all classes - educational exhibits can be a poster, recipe box, notebook, or other display showing and describing something learned, a project or activity completed, a food nutrition community service program, etc. The exhibits should relate to the things done in the project in which the member is enrolled.
14. Highly recommend to not use same recipe, the following year if a purple is received.
15. **Food Gift Package** – No alcoholic beverages will be accepted. In all classes, a food gift package must contain at least 3 different items, prepared by the 4-H'er, in a suitable container no larger than 18"x18"x18". Prepared food items must have recipes included. Additional prepared or purchased item can be included. Food products will not be opened or tasted - recommended for packaging to allow all or part of product to be seen. Evaluation standards include: creativity in presentation and container, appropriateness for desired situation considered, canned items should follow recommended standards for food preservation, and appearance of prepared food items - should be attractive and meet standard of the product, i.e. uniform size, evenly browned.
16. The Grand Champions will be eligible to sell the product on Monday night at the Premium Sale. You may sell only food item or livestock, but not both.
17. NOTE: A collection of your favorite recipes in a recipe box or notebook does not constitute an educational exhibit.
18. Exhibitor must specify how canned goods are processed.
19. **All exhibitors are required to wear the official Smith County Free Fair t-shirt when showing their exhibits.**
20. **Attendance is required of the exhibitor at the pre-fair clean up and set up and at the post fair clean up. The Exhibitor is required to work 1 shift (3-4 hrs) at the 4-H Food Stand. Fair premium money/premium auction eligibility will be withheld.**

1. Recommended method of processing must be used. Recipes must be from current, test resources listed below and must be adjusted for altitude based on your processing location, or it will be disqualified. Follow guidelines in K-State Research and Extension Food Preservation publications or “USDA Complete Guide to Home Canning @2015”; or “So Easy to Preserve, 6th Edition; Ball Blue Book Guide to Preserving, Edition 38; Ball Complete Book of Home Preserving. @2024. KSRE Rapid Response Center Preservation Recipes; National Center for Home Food Preservation; Ball and Kerr Canning mixes (i.e. Mrs Wage’s Ball); Pectin manufacturers (i.e. SureJell, Ball). Open kettle processed food and oven canned food will be disqualified. Pickles and sweet spreads must be finished using a water bath process for the altitude of residence. Low acid products must be pressure processed properly for the altitude of residence. 2. No alcohol should be included as an ingredient in food preservation entries. Entries with alcohol in the recipe will be disqualified and not be judged.
3. There are no safe recommendations to can white peaches or elderberries.
4. Each exhibit must have the complete recipe and instructions with the entry card, or will be lowered one ribbon placing. Recipe must include recipe source, date of publication and altitude of residence.
5. Exhibits must be sealed in clean standard canning jars, with matching brand (use Ball lid on Ball jars, etc.) two-piece lids. Ball and Kerr plaid or fruit decorated or brushed silver lids are permissible, but fancy padded lids, fabric over wraps or cozies interfere with the judging process and should not be used. No fancy packs unless recipe state to do so (ex: Pickled asparagus) Jars must be sealed when entered. Jelly must be in half pints or pint jar. All other products must be in pint or quart jars. Note: There are now 12- ounce and 24-ounce canning jars available. If there is not a USDA recommendation process time available for the 12-ounce jar, these may be used a pint jar canning process recommendation. Use Quart jar process recommendations for 24-ounce jars.
6. Each jar exhibited must be labeled. The label must not cover brand name of jar. The label must give: Class No, Product, Altitude where processed, Canning Method (water bath, weighted gauge or dial gauge pressure method), Process Time, Pressure (psi), date processed including month and year, Name, and County/District. Templates to make adhesive labels can be found at: https://www.kansas4-h.org/events-activities/fairs/kansas-state-fair/docs/foods-and-nutrition/Foods_Label.pdf
7. If dried food product is not in a canning jar, it will be lowered one ribbon rating. Suggested amount: 1/3 – ½ cup, or three or four pieces per exhibit. Dried products must include the recipe, preparation steps and heating instructions.
8. All meat jerky must be heated to an internal temperature of 160 degrees F before or after drying. This is not the drying temperature! Jerky not heated to an internal temperature of 160 degrees F will be disqualified and not be judged. Heating information can be found in “Dry Meat Safely at Home.”

1. Posters can be flat poster board or foam board, no larger than 22" x 28."
2. Tri-fold educational displays must be free standing and no larger than 36" x 48."
3. Photos of 4-H member in purchased outfit must demonstrate criteria as outlined on scoresheet. Consider multiple angles, good light and highlight details so that the judge may accurately evaluate the exhibit.
4. Exhibits should include actual photos of 4-H member in garments, and may also include pictures from magazines or the internet

Eligibility – 4-H members wishing to exhibit must be enrolled in the Shopping in Style project and receive a qualifying ribbon rating at their local county fair.

Quota – A 4-H member may make only one entry in this division.

- A. an outfit you purchased to wear with a clothing item that was already in your wardrobe that still fit but you didn't wear anymore. Explains why the clothing item was not being worn and what you did to transform it into a wearable garment again. **OR**
- B. a top and bottom that you purchased, as well as at least three pieces of clothing in your existing wardrobe that you can mix and match with the new items to create multiple outfits. Includes a clothing inventory and explain what you have learned by completing this activity. **OR**
- C. an outfit you purchased and explain why you selected the garment you did, your shopping budget, and cost per wear; **OR**
- D. an outfit you purchased and explain how advertising influences clothing purchases making a distinction between wants and needs. Include your shopping budget and cost per wear. **OR**
- E. an outfit you purchased along with a cost comparison between garments/accessories purchased vs. sewing/constructing the outfit. Comparison should include variety of shopping options and/or price tracking at stores over a period of time.

4022 Shopping in Style: Senior – Choose one of the following activities from Unit 5 or Unit 6 (Ages 14-18) of the curriculum project manuals. Exhibit should consist of a display that showcases:

- A. an outfit you purchased and care requirements not only for this garment but also for garments made of other natural and synthetic fibers. Display should also include a care cost analysis for garments of different fibers; **OR**
- B. an outfit you purchased which you have repaired or altered. Include a clothing inventory list which includes cost savings for repaired items as compared to purchasing replacement garments; **OR**

- C. an outfit you purchased along with plans and commentary for a fashion show that that would capture the attention of an audience. Plans should identify target audience, venue, theme, budget, and logistical plan for the fashion show; **OR**
- D. an outfit you purchased and explain 3 methods of clothing repair that you have learned, i.e. torn seam, torn hem, replacing a button, etc. Display should also include photos and list of your assembled clothing first aid kit. Include itemized expenses; **OR**

Rules:

1. A 4-H member may choose to exhibit in the Collection or Educational class for each phase, or both.
2. Individual entries are to be placed in glass covered boxes 18 x 24 x 3 ½ inches (maximum). See specific phase for box and specimen numbers. Choose to use one of two taxonomies: as printed in "Insects in Kansas" book or www.bugguide.net
3. Each exhibitor is required to identify each box with two identification labels bearing the exhibitor's name, county or district and the class and the statement of taxonomy used. One label in the upper left corner of the box (inside) and the other on the back of the box (outside). Arrange specimens in the box so the box can be displayed lengthwise.
4. The number of orders, specimens (and families where required) must be included on both of the exhibitor's box identification labels. Only one adult insect per species can be used in the Collection Boxes and Notebook Classes, unless labeled as male or female and correctly identified.
5. Arrangement of specimens: The preferred method is to arrange the insects in groups or rows parallel to the short sides of the box.
6. Specimens are to be arranged by Order in the box, then Family where required.
7. Two labels should be centered on the pin beneath each specimen. First (closest to the specimen) is the common name label and the second label should include date/locality. Full county name and state abbreviation should be on the second label. Collector's name or host on the date/locality label is optional.
8. The specimens should be collected by the exhibitor and should focus on Kansas insects. Insects may be collected from one county into bordering states and labeled accordingly. Please refer to "Entomology Collection Exhibit Resource" for full details on out-of-state insects in collections. Refer to the publication "[Entomology Collection Notebook Guidelines](#)" on the Kansas 4-H Entomology web page for more detailed rules for exhibiting.
9. Only specimens of the class Insecta should be included.
10. Purchased insects are not to be exhibited in collections, but they may be used in educational displays.
11. Specimens of soft bodied insects such as aphids, lice, termites, etc. should be exhibited in alcohol filled vials; however, the use of alcohol filled vials should be limited to only those specimens that lose their shape when pinned, since the vials pose a significant hazard to the rest of the collection if they become loose in transit.
12. Introductory Entomology is for 7-8 years old or interested beginners of any age. Years in class: two years maximum. Class not eligible for State Fair.
Any major violation of rules will result in the exhibit being dropped one ribbon placing. Examples would include, but are not limited to: incorrect display box size, missing paperwork, feet on display boxes, no special project in notebooks, etc.
13. After the first year in Entomology, all 4-H members need to add an 8 ½ by 11-inch sheet of paper to their collection that states what they did to improve their collection for the current year. This should include how many new insects were added to the display box (please list), how many insects were replaced in the display box (please list), and box. Other optional things that could be included are number of insects caught for the year, number of new Orders added this year, number of talks and/or demonstrations given, activities participated in, leadership roles, etc. This paper should be taped to the upper left corner on the front of your display box.
14. The following insects are listed as Threatened or Endangered by the Fish and Wildlife Service. Because of this, no specimens of the below species may be caught or displayed in insect collections or educational displays. If specimens of these species are included in collections or educational displays, it will be counted as a major violation. Any major violation of rules will result in the exhibit being dropped one ribbon placing. Please refer to www.kansas4-h.org on the Entomology project page for more information.
American Burying Beetle (*Nicrophorus americanus*)
Monarch Butterfly (*Danaus plexippus*)

Rules:

1. The standard size exhibit box should be 18" x 24" x 3 ½". All specimens are to be arranged across the narrow (18") dimension of the exhibit box, making the exhibit 18" across the top and 24" deep. If a box has a sliding plexiglass cover, it must be removable from the top. Screws, locks or other devices that would prevent judges from removing glass cover should not be used.
2. Each exhibitor is required to identify each display box by placing an identification label bearing name, county, and number of specimens in the upper left-hand corner of the box (inside), and by attaching a label with the same information to the back of the box (outside). The inside label is to also indicate the class number.
3. Exhibitor may enter in both geology and lapidary classes. Exhibitor may show in only one of the first three geology classes. Exhibitor may also show in geology class (special exhibit) and in one or more of the lapidary classes.
4. Geology specimens should be labeled with the number of the specimens, date collected, the legal description (section, township, range of the specimen).

All specimens must be collected in the state of Kansas (only exception-see #7) during the current 4-H year, which will be allowed starting on the day after the conclusion of the State Fair.

5. For the Geology class (510, 511, 512) specimens should be mounted in the box by proper groups-rocks, minerals, fossils. Fossils must be identified to the Phylum, Class and Genus level (if possible or part if Genus cannot be determined). The Genus specimen name is to begin with a capital letter and the whole specimen's name must either be italicized or underlined, not both.. Species name is not required however, if a species name is used it must be all lowercase and either italicized or underlined, not both. The words "Phylum, Class, Genus" on labels are to be spelled out, not abbreviated. More than one specimen of the same kind of rock or mineral or species of a fossil may be exhibited if this duplication represents different geological formations. Specimen label must show this distinction (Fort Hays limestone, not just limestone; calcite from the Greenhorn Formation, not just calcite; Phylum: Brachiopoda Class: Articulata Genus: Composita from the Morrill Limestone Member, not just Phylum: Brachiopoda Class: Articulata Genus: Composita).
6. For geology classes (510, 511, 512) all specimens must be collected (not purchased) from locations in Kansas or from counties bordering Kansas. Out-of-state specimens will not count in the minimum number of the class, nor will they be considered in the judging.
7. **All exhibitors are required to wear the official Smith County Free Fair t-shirt when showing their exhibits.**
8. **Attendance is required of the exhibitor at the pre-fair clean up and set up and at the post fair clean up. The Exhibitor is required to work 1 shift (3-4 hrs) at the 4-H Food Stand. Fair premium money/premium auction eligibility will be withheld.**

1. Exhibits may be black and white or color photographs and cannot be larger than 8x10 with **no white border**, larger pictures will be lowered one ribbon.
2. 10 entries and 1 album
3. To protect exhibits from dust and moisture, it is **required** that they be placed in a two-gallon zip top bag. Or photo sleeve.
4. Pictures will be judged on composition, storytelling, ability, photographic quality, and neatness of mounting.
5. All exhibits will be divided into Jr. Division and Sr. Division before judging.
6.
 - a. Entries in single 8 x 10 class are to be mounted across the narrow dimension of white posterboard 11 x 12.5. Photographs must be mounted 1" from the top and equal distance from side to side.
 - c. Pictures may be cropped to appropriate size.
 - d. A permanent mount must be made by using photographic adhesive.
7. Improperly mounted or sized photos will be awarded a ribbon one placing lower than the placing determined by the official judges
8. * indicates classes eligible for State Fair
9. In addition to the "*" items, if the judge feels that a snapshot is good enough to go to the State Fair, he may award a purple ribbon. A 4-H'er may then choose to enlarge the snapshot for the State Fair.
10. Photographs taken with a digital camera and having no more adjustments than exposure, color intensity or correction, one click filter effects, red eye removal, cropping, dodging and burning should be entered in the standard color or black and white classes. HDR photos are to be entered the in the standard photo class.
11. The black and white classes are for black and white photos only. Monochromatic prints, including sepia print and considered color photos and must be entered in the appropriate color photo class.
12. The date and time must be removed from all photos entered.
13. Digital Composite Image: Finished photo must be created from two or more original images photographed by exhibitor. HDR photos do not qualify for this class Photos will be judged on photographic merit as well as manipulation technique and process. Ribbon placement will be determined by combining the score of each judging section.

(CONT.) DEPARTMENT 50 - PHOTOGRAPHY 4-H

14. Appropriate photo subject matter: Photographic subject matter is expected to follow 4-H standards. For a sense of prohibited subject matter, review the Kansas 4-H member Code of Conduct; in general, if it is not allowable at a 4-H event, it is not allowable in a 4-H photograph at the County Fair.
15. Photos with live subject(s) on railroad right away or taken from railroad right of way property will not be displayed in Kansas 4-H Photography and will be disqualified and not judged.
16. My Favorite 4-H Photography Display: This new class is only for those photography project members with 10 or more years of experience. This class is a non-judged mounted display consisting of four favorite photos from the member's photography career in 4-H. All photos and a fifth biography/description with details of why they are regarded as most significant will be mounted on white or cream studio matte board. Photos and biography/description will be displayed on one row of the photography racks. This class is an extra way to showcase the development and accomplishments of the 4-H member's photography career. Members can still enter two other classes, if they are enrolled 8 or more years in the photography project.
17. **All exhibitors are required to wear the official Smith County Free Fair t-shirt when showing their exhibits.**
18. **Attendance is required of the exhibitor at the pre-fair clean up and set up and at the post fair clean up. The Exhibitor is required to work 1 shift (3-4 hrs) at the 4-H Food Stand. Fair premium money/premium auction eligibility will be withheld.**

542a My Favorite 4-H Photography. 1. This is a "display only" class. 2. Eligible members must have enrolled in photography for ten (10) or more years. 3. Requirements are: A. If the photo is an unmounted print, mount it using standard 4-H requirements and mat board. B. Think beyond camera skills and include leadership, community service, etc. -Tell of any mentors/leaders worked with. -Share workshops or camps pertaining to photography you attended. -Explain (if relevant) any plans to use photography skills beyond 4-H/High School. -Include a small (2 x 3) photo of yourself at the start of the biography. -Print the biography document and mount it on a standard mat board. 4. Place name and Extension unit on the back of each of the 5 mat boards in the upper right-hand corner. 5. This exhibit does not have to qualify at the county/district level to exhibit at the Kansas State Fair. 6. There is no data slip required. 7. A member who qualifies to exhibit in this class is still allowed to enter two prints and a portfolio for judging if qualifications for those classes are met.

543 – Growth Portfolio

1. Member must have been enrolled in Photography project for three (3) years or more.
2. Exhibit will consist of one photo for each year of enrollment. Each photo must have been created in a different year and must be labeled with the year taken/project enrollment year. A maximum of 5 photos may be included, if the member has 5 or more years of enrollment. Photos are not required to be in a consecutive order. For example, a nine-year-old with three years enrollment in photography is eligible to enter a growth portfolio. The portfolio in this example should have one photo from the seven-year-olds year, one photo from the eight-year-olds year, and one photo from the nine-year-olds year. The growth portfolio class may start at any time in the member's photography career. For an older member, the growth portfolio would represent any five years in the project, for example, years 1,3,5,7 and 9 for a member having project enrollment totaling 9 years.

3. Photos must be 8" x 10" and may be color or black and white. and must be unmounted.
4. An information sheet must accompany each photo giving brand and model of camera used to create the photo. The settings for focal length, aperture, mode and shutter speed must also be listed.
5. A short introduction of the photographer should be placed in the first page. This introduction should tell why the 4-H member enrolled in the Photography project and why they have continued to enroll. Exhibitor could also tell of a fun event photographed, a learning experience that taught them new skills or other related learning.
6. Beginning with photo 2, member description of GROWTH in project skill must be included on information sheet.
7. Exhibit will consist of introductory page, skill sheet and photo from each year in chronological order. And arranged in a portfolio book. Skill sheet will go in left hand page and unmounted photos in right hand page.

544 – Career Portfolio

1. Member must have been enrolled in Photography for 5 (five) or more years OR member must be age 15 -19 and been enrolled in photography for at least two (2) years.
2. Exhibit will consist of ten (10) 8 x 10 photos showing skill development in one of the following photography areas: Portraiture, Special Effects (not done with computer), Landscape, Photojournalism, Black and White, Nature/Wildlife or Graphic Design (computer skills with photos). Photos may have been created over multiple project years.
3. Photos may be color except if Black and White option is chosen and must be unmounted.
4. An information sheet must accompany each photo giving brand and model of camera used to create the photo. The settings for focal length, aperture, mode and shutter speed must also be listed.
5. A one-page summary should accompany the portfolio listing the goal for pursuing this area of photography and what skills were learned while doing so. Mentors should be acknowledged. Career exploration can also be described.
6. Exhibit will be presented in a notebook designed for portfolio review with pages for required information from #4 and #5.

NOTE: A member may enter only one portfolio each year. Portfolio must have qualified at the County/District Level beginning with 4-H year 2023-2024.

Exhibitors receiving a purple ribbon who plan to take their exhibit to the Kansas State Fair need to check the 2025 Kansas State Fair 4-H Exhibitors Handbook for additional details, including those on educational exhibit rules, labels and information packets.

4-H AG MECHANICS WELDING

This project allows youth to explore areas of ag mechanics welding and metallurgy from repairing or repurposing items to the fabrication of new items. The intent is for this program to start with foundational areas, some of which youth may already have, and allow them to continue to build on this knowledge becoming more experienced.

1. Wheeled exhibits must utilize a braking mechanism which prevents the exhibit from freely rolling while on display.
2. Exhibitors are responsible for providing sufficient braking or “chocks” for trailer exhibits to ensure that the exhibits do not move once positioned. If using a wheel Chocking mechanism, the two individual blocks should be connected together as a pair of chocks, so they do not become separated. At least one pair of chocks should be placed on each side of the trailer to prevent movement.
3. For trailer exhibits the tongue of the trailer should have a locking mechanism (e.g. padlock) to prevent the trailer from being moved by unauthorized individuals while being displayed. **A key for the locking mechanism should be left with the superintendent or with State Fair Extension Staff and labeled with the exhibitor’s name, county, and phone number.**
4. For exhibits with downward swinging parts, such as tailgates, that could pose a fall/striking/crushing hazard should have a tamper resistant locking mechanism such as a “zip-tie” or a “cotton-key” through a release pin that would prevent the swinging part from being accidentally released and falling on someone.
5. Each exhibit must be free-standing or sufficiently supported by an exhibitor supplied support system that is moveable and is part of the total dimensions and weight of the exhibit. Exhibit display boards should have a portable and moveable base. and examples should be firmly affixed to the board to ensure all parts of the display stay together No exhibits may be staked to the ground for display.
6. Top heavy items should be braced or placed in a stand sufficient to prevent it from toppling over while on display.
7. Exhibits may not be bound, affixed, attached to the State Fair buildings, except by the superintendent, State Fair Staff, or State Fair Extension Staff.

CONT. 4-H AG MECHANICS WELDING

8. Painting or spot painting is not allowed on projects after arrival on fairgrounds. If wet paint is detected by judges or superintendents one ribbon placing will be deducted.
9. Repair projects having adequate original finish need not be repainted
10. Cutting surfaces, such as blades, are to have a protective covering over them to prevent injury. The covering should be easily removed and reinstalled for judging. Foam “pool noodles” and multiple layers of cardboard are acceptable.
11. Display cases for small exhibits are acceptable and must be easily opened so the item can be removed and examined as part of the judging.
12. Exhibits that include weaponry of any kind will be disqualified. Weaponry is defined as any instrument, possession, or creation, physical and/or electrical that is intended to be used to inflict damage and/or harm to individuals, animal life, and/or property.
13. Trailers and large exhibits (those larger than 5 feet in any dimension) may be displayed outside, and exhibitors with such exhibits are to contact the Kansas State 4-H office **NO LATER THAN August 23rd** to arrange placement time and location.
14. If the exhibit is powered by flammable liquids (gas, propane, kerosene, etc.) the fuel tank and lines should be drained and allowed to dry, to avoid spills and potential fires
15. Electric powered (battery, corded, solar, or alternative energy) should have a primary shutoff or disconnect switch
16. If a safety violation is noted by the judges, superintendent, or other staff, the exhibitor’s exhibit, at the judges’ discretion, will receive a deduction in ribbon placement or a participation ribbon
17. The exhibitor’s name(s) and county or district must be tagged or labeled on the display – **See State fair rules for more information.**
18. Each exhibitor is required to complete the “4-H Ag Mechanics Welding Exhibit Information Form” for each exhibit, except for display boards, which is available through your local K-State Research and Extension office or at <http://welding.engtech4ks.com/>. This form must be attached to the outside of a 10” x 13” manila envelope. Do not tie the envelope to the exhibit.
19. Each exhibit information packet should include the following items:
 - a. Bill of materials for the project with associated costs, scrap items used may be listed as having a \$0.00 cost
 - b. 1 to 5 pages of photos showing work on the exhibit, preferably from a beginning state to final or completed state
 - c. If appropriate schematics or working drawings relating to the creation or repair, this is not required for display boards.
 - d. If appropriate operating instructions
20. For the State Fair, the 4-H member can include a video showcasing the project as well as a walkthrough of any project mechanics.
 - a. Videos with an accompanying release form (include link) signed by the exhibitor’s parent or guardian may be displayed at the State Fair in the Engineering & Technology exhibit area.
 - b. The video must not be more than 8 minutes long and should be included on the USB drive.
 - c. FOR COUNTY FAIRS with consultation judging, it is recommended that the video elements be waived in favor of talking with the exhibitor.

BUILDING BLOCK ENGINEERING

1. Total exhibit dimensions may not exceed 2 feet high, by 2 feet wide, by 2 feet deep. The minimum exhibit dimensions must be at least 6 inches wide and deep.
2. All exhibits are required to be placed in a sturdy see-through enclosure with a top, bottom, and 4 sides. A ‘clear’ tub turned upside down with the exhibit placed on the lid would be an acceptable enclosure. It may be desirable to place a cutting board or other hard surface between the lid and base plate of the exhibit to make it sturdier. This is to keep exhibit parts from being “scattered to parts unknown” at the fair. The outer dimensions of the enclosure **do not count** towards the total exhibit dimensions but should not be excessive. The entire exhibit should fit in the display enclosure so the enclosure does not smash into the exhibit during movement.
3. All components used in construction should be dust and hair free, clean, free of chips, scuffs, cracks or broken blocks.
4. Gaps or cracks should not be visible between assembled blocks unless they fit with the story, for example an earthquake
5. The primary building component should be interlocking blocks, commonly referred to by the brand name of Lego®
6. Other components can be integrated into dioramas to illustrate architectural aspects that may be difficult to convey with traditional interlocking blocks or example marbles for small round objects
7. **The use of existing “store bought” sets for major architectural elements of the display is not allowed**, use of figurines from sets is allowed as is using individual bricks or small sub-assemblies to create something different than the architectural component of the set it came from. For example, a car hood or front end from a car kit could be used in a “car museum,” just not the entire car. Store bought sets shall be shown under visual arts/ arts & crafts sections for fairness.
8. Displays must have significant architectural components (walls, windows, doors, roofs, canopies flying buttresses, etc.), landscapes are strongly discouraged. Designs should have a central theme. Dioramas should be suitably complex and have multiple elements, for example, a camp site that has a log cabin, tree fort, and a car. The intent of this is to ensure fairness among exhibitors and encourage maximum creativity instead of just following a set of plans.
9. Dioramas should be suitably complex and have multiple elements. For example, a camp site that has a log cabin, a tree fort, and a car.
10. All dioramas should have a story, which is part of the information pack, that describes what is happening in the diorama; this can be as simple (the nursery rhyme “Jack and Jill” for example) or complex as needed to explain to someone looking at the exhibit what is happening.
11. Gaps or cracks should not be visible between assembled blocks unless they fit with the story, for example an earthquake.
12. Vehicles that are intended to stay in a single place should be affixed to base plates with sticky tack, hot glue, or other method
13. Mechanical enhancements or motion elements that add motion to the diorama are acceptable and encouraged. If used judges should be able to use them and instructions should be provided for operation.
14. Artistic designs with no architectural design/components are not permitted and two ribbon placings will be deducted
15. The exhibitor’s name(s) and county or district must be tagged or labeled on the display. Additionally, the display case should have the exhibitor’s information attached to both the lid and clear container as well, as the case may be separated from the display.
16. Entry of either a packet without an accompanying exhibit, or an exhibit without a packet is not a sufficient exhibit.
17. Each exhibitor is required to complete the “4-H Building Block Engineering Exhibit Information Form” which is available through your local K-State Research and Extension office or at <http://blocks.engtech4ks.com/> . This form must be attached to the outside of a 10” x 13” manila envelope. Do not tie the envelope to the exhibit.
18. Each exhibit information packet should include the following items:
 - a. 1 to 5 pages of photos showing work on the exhibit, preferably from a beginning state to final or completed state
 - b. If appropriate operating instructions for mechanical portions of the diorama.
19. Building Block Engineering exhibits may be checked out for use in a Kansas State Fair 4-H demonstration or 4-H illustrated talk with prior permission. For permission, check with the superintendent or the information desk in 4-H Centennial Hall. The exhibit must be returned to display immediately after the demonstration/illustrated talk or the exhibit will be disqualified.

ASTRONOMY

This Engineering and Technology exhibit area is designed to provide youth with the opportunity to explore space through telescopes, research, and observation.

Rules:

1. Telescopes entered in this division may be built from a kit or by original design. Pre-finished telescopes, which require no construction are not acceptable exhibits.
2. Telescopes are limited to no more than six feet in length. They must be placed on a stationary stand that does not allow the telescope to roll and/or fall over. The stand cannot extend past two feet in length or width.
3. Each telescope exhibit must include a "4-H Astronomy Exhibit Information Form," which is available through your local K-State Research and Extension office or at <http://astronomy.engtech4ks.com/>. This form must be attached to the outside of a 10" x 13" manila envelope. Do not tie the envelope to the exhibit. You must also include construction plans (or a photocopy) of the telescope and place it inside the manila envelope. For notebooks, display boards, and posters, no additional exhibit information is required; no manila envelope is needed for these exhibits.
4. See the last section for full details about exhibiting posters, display boards and notebooks.
5. At least two photographs showing telescope construction and operation are required. Photographs should be mounted on one side of an 8 1/2" x 11" page. A brief caption should accompany each photograph. Place photos in the 10" x 13" manila envelope. Up to 10 pages of pictures can be included.
6. The telescope must be properly assembled and painted with a smooth and uniform finish.
7. Telescopes designed by the exhibitor must be original, not a modification of an existing kit. A form must be filled out to go on. Find the form at <http://astronomy.engtech4ks.com/>
8. Exhibitor's name, county or district, age, and year(s) in project must be tagged or labeled on the telescope.
9. If a safety violation is noted by the judges, superintendent, or other staff, the exhibitor's exhibit, at the judge's discretion, will receive a white ribbon.
10. All exhibitors are required to wear the official Smith County Free Fair t-shirt when showing their exhibits.
11. Attendance is required of the exhibitor at the pre-fair clean up and set up and at the post fair clean up. The Exhibitor is required to work 1 shift (3-4 hrs) at the 4-H Food Stand. Fair premium money/premium auction eligibility will be withheld.

COMPUTER SCIENCE

The Kansas 4-H Computer Science System project is designed to allow 4-H members to explore how information is moved from one part of the computer to the other; how information is moved between two or more computer systems (networking); how information is stored; or how information is acted on (programming).

Rules: See the 2025 State Fair Book for a Complete set of Rules

1. The actual construction of computer hardware (For example, building a computer, which would include computer components plugged into a motherboard, discrete circuitry soldered on a printed circuit board, or wire-wrapped circuitry) will be entered in the Electronics Division., except for exhibits entered in Class 5594.
2. If a safety violation is noted by the judge, superintendent, or other staff, the exhibitor's exhibit, at the judge's discretion, will be disqualified. A safety violation could include Malware, a virus, or any similar program that potentially is harmful.

Exhibit Requirements

1. All exhibits in the Computer Science division must be entered on a USB drive containing all supporting documents as listed below for each class.
 - a. The USB drive should be included in a manila folder with the Computer Exhibit Form (found at <http://computers.engtech4ks.com/> or your local extension office) attached to the front.
 - b. The USB drive should be labeled with the 4-H member's name and county.
2. Source code must be included on the USB drive for all computer programming projects coded by the 4-H member. This could include a .txt file, python file, Scratch URL, etc. Failure to include the source code will result in one ribbon deduction.
3. Each exhibit must include written operating instructions including how to locate, run, and use the project. Operating instructions should be printed and placed in the manila envelope and included digitally on the USB drive.
4. Each exhibit must be accompanied by a typed requirements document included on the USB drive. See [link] for a template that can be used for documenting requirements.
 - a. The requirements document should be started at the beginning of the project. It will include a list of goals and requirements that the 4-H member wants to include or achieve in their final project.
 - b. The project requirements section is formatted as a checklist, with the 4-Her checking off what they accomplished and making adjustments throughout their work on the project as needed.
 - c. Flow charts, designs, or other diagrams may be included for computer programs to show the logical flow of the program as needed.
5. For coded computer programs, screenshots of the program will be displayed digitally at the state fair. Screenshots must be included electronically on the USB drive. For county fairs, it is recommended to print screenshots for display at fairs that don't have electronic displays available.
6. All electric components of micro controlled devices must be adequately covered or concealed with a protective enclosure. Paper is NOT considered an adequate enclosure or covering for electrical components.
7. For the State Fair, the 4-H Member must include a video showcasing how to open and run the project as well as a walkthrough of any project mechanics.
 - a. Videos with an accompanying release form (<http://computers.engtech4ks.com/>) signed by the exhibitor's parent or guardian may be displayed at the state fair in the Engineering and Technology exhibit area.
 - b. The video must not be more than 8 minutes long and should be included on the USB drive.
8. FOR COUNTY FAIRS with consultation judging, it is recommended that the video elements be waived in favor of talking with the exhibitor.

Judging

1. Kansas State Fair Judge(s) in the computer system division will have a physical computer with the following minimum configuration to test exhibits with and view files:
 - a. Microsoft Windows® 10 or Windows® 11
 - b. Microsoft Office® 365 (Excel, Power Point, & Word)
 - c. Microsoft Visual Studio®
 - d. Microsoft Edge Browser®
 - e. Mozilla Firefox® Browser

 - h. Apache Open Office®
 - i. Scratch Desktop editor (offline version)
2. Judging of micro controlled devices is based on the code, not the hardware.
3. Judging will be based on a score sheet that can be found at <http://computers.engtech4ks.com/>. There are three (3) areas each exhibit will be judged on. They are:
 - a. Requirements document
 - b. Operating Instructions
 - c. Functionality (how well did the project meet project objectives)

ROBOTICS

Rules:

Exhibitor's name(s) and county or district must be tagged or labeled in a prominent location on the robot.

Creativity, workmanship, and functionality will be strong criteria in judging the "Robot designed by Exhibitor" classes.

1. Robot dimensions should not exceed 2 feet high, by 2 feet wide, by 2 feet deep.
2. All electric components of the robot must be adequately covered or concealed with a protective enclosure. Paper is NOT considered an adequate enclosure or covering for electrical components. Robots may be powered by an electrical, battery, water, air or solar source only. Junk drawer robots may be powered by a non-traditional power source. Robots powered by fossil fuels/flammable liquids will be disqualified. Robots that include weaponry of any kind will be disqualified. Weaponry is defined as any instrument, possession or creation, physical and/or electrical that could be used to inflict damage and/or harm to individuals, animal life, and/or property.
3. **Remote controlled robots** are allowed under certain conditions provided that the robot is **not drivable**. Robots programmed on phones/tablets need to have a specific program created, using motion controls to move the robot are not acceptable, for example "press forward on the screen to make the robot go forward. Robotic arms (hydraulic or electric) are allowed. A remote is allowed provided more than a single action happens when a single button is pressed on the remote, for example "a motor spins for 3 seconds, at which point an actuator is triggered, then the motor spins for 3 more seconds." Remote controlled cars, boats, planes and/or action figures, etc. are not allowed.
4. Each robot must be in working condition. The judges will operate each robot to evaluate its workmanship and its ability to complete its intended task.
5. Each exhibitor is required to complete the "4-H Robotics Exhibit Information Form" which is available from the Extension office. This form must be attached to the outside of a 10" x 13" manila envelope.
6. The exhibit must include written instructions for operation (the instructions should be written as if they were to tell a grandparent or elderly person how to operate the robot), construction plans, (do not need to be printed), a video, and one to five pages of project photographs. This information should be placed inside the 10" x 13" manila envelope mentioned above. The exhibitor may enter their electronic project listed under the energy management program if the exhibitor so chooses. No exhibitor will be allowed to set up their robot in person at the state fair.
8. See the last section for full details about exhibiting posters, display boards and notebooks.
9. If a safety violation is noted by the judges, superintendents, or other staff, the exhibitor's exhibit, at the judges' discretion, will receive a white ribbon.

AEROSPACE/ROCKETRY

This is a reduced set of rules for use at county fairs. The use of these rules is optional and left to the discretion of the county fairs. These are more simplistic rules that cover the most common scenarios that are likely to appear at county fairs. Youth who are eligible for the Kansas State Fair should read the Kansas State Fair rules for this division as the State Fair rules expect more from youth and set a higher bar as it is a state-wide event exhibiting the best from across the State of Kansas.

Reduced Set of Rules:

1. If a rocket qualified for the Kansas State Fair, exhibitors should read the State Fair Rules for the Rocketry division as they may be different from those at the county fair. Be sure to check class numbers, they may be different.
2. Each exhibitor may enter up to two rocket exhibits that have been constructed during the current year. If two rockets are entered, one rocket must be a "model rocket kit", the second may be entered into any other applicable class. An exhibitor may not enter two rockets in the same class.
3. 4-H members are to complete and sign the rocketry information form, available from <http://rocketry.engtech4ks.com/> or your local extension office and attach it to a 10" x 13" "manila" envelope. The envelope should contain:
 - a. Instructions on how to construct the rocket
 - b. Up to 5 pages of pictures, pictures are to be attached to sheets of paper, from both construction and launch
 - c. Documentation of any flight damage that occurred
 - d. Any modifications made to the rocket except for paint scheme and decals.
 - e. An additional page for altitude calculations if the space on the form is not enough.
 - f. Additionally, for original design rockets, also known as "scratch built" rockets:
 - i. 5 additional pages of photos are allowed
 - ii. Documentation of how the rocket was tested for stability
4. If a safety violation is noted by the judges, superintendent, or other staff, the exhibitor's rocket, at the judges' discretion, will receive a participation ribbon.
5. Rockets are to be displayed upright on a display stand with a sturdy rod that does not extend past the top of the rocket, or stand unassisted, unless the rocket is taller than 4 feet in which case no display stand is required and the rocket may be displayed on its side, rockets are not to be displayed on launch pads to save space and prevent someone from being poked in the eye.
6. Rockets ARE NOT to be displayed with used or unused rocket engines either in the rocket or as part of the stand, if rocket engines are included in the exhibit the judge may disqualify the exhibit.
7. Rockets should be flown unless there is an active burn ban in the county or conditions are too dangerous to safely launch the rocket. Just flying the last stage (the part with the nose cone) of a multi-stage rocket is acceptable.
8. Rockets, *except those in the JR division*, are not to be "beginner kits" or use prefabricated (molded plastic) fin assemblies, or pre-finished rockets requiring no painting. These are only acceptable in the JR division at the county fair. Rockets of this type outside the JR division should be disqualified. Rockets entered in the JR division *may not* go on to the Kansas State Fair.
9. Angles of fins must fall within a plus or minus 2-degree variation using an approved fin alignment guide (such as KSSTAC10). An official fin guide is available from <http://rocketry.engtech4ks.com/>
10. Fins and body tubes, except those in the introductory division, are to be filled and sealed with putty, sanding sealer, and/or primer or other suitable filler to eliminate the appearance of body grooves and wood grain.
11. Fins and launch lugs are to be filleted to reduce drag and properly secure them to the model.
12. Engine mounts are to be securely attached to the body tube.
13. Any seams on plastic parts are to be sanded smooth.
14. The recovery system (typically a parachute or streamer) should be attached according to the instructions
15. The nose cone is to fit snugly but still allow for easy removal.
16. Exhibits must be uniformly painted and smoothly finished without "runs," "orange peel," or "alligator skin" or finished as per rocket instructions (for example, no painting required), and decals, if used, are applied smoothly.
17. Models may not be judged based on their paint scheme (colors and placement on the rocket), except for rockets that fit the definition of a 'scale model*' and are entered in the scale model class. All other rockets do not have to follow the suggested paint scheme, allowing the 4-H'er to display maximum creativity in the finishing of their rocket. Under no circumstances is the weight given to the paint scheme to be sufficient enough, by itself, to move the non-scale model from one ribbon placing to another.
18. "Scale models*" entered in the scale model class may be judged based on their paint scheme. The judge may deduct up to one ribbon placing for not following the paint scheme.
19. "Scale Models*" displayed in the scale model class are to be finished and completed with a majority (greater than 70%) of decals. For all other rockets the use of decals is optional. (The following rules (20-31) apply to advanced exhibits.)
20. Original design rockets cannot be a modification of a pre-existing kit and must be of original design.
22. Exhibitor(s) must be 11 years of age (4-H age) or older to enter an original design rocket.
23. Original design rockets must include detailed instructions, so that someone could construct the original designed rocket just like a kit purchased at a store. Instructions can be as many pages as needed to convey full and complete construction techniques.
24. For a rocket entered in the original design classes, describe in the summary how the rocket was tested for stability prior to flying. Swing testing of the rocket is required. Other tests and calculations are strongly encouraged. Exhibitors must include documentation of the swing test. Failure to swing test a rocket will result in a deduction of TWO ribbon placings.
25. Rockets that use more than one 'D' engine or equivalent are considered mid or high-power rockets in 4-H.
26. Mid and High-Power exhibitors must be at least 14 years of age by January 1 of the current year.

CONT. AEROSPACE/ROCKETRY

27. In addition to the information packet completed for all rockets, a high-power information form is to be completed and placed inside of the information packet. This may be downloaded from <http://rocketry.engtech4ks.com/>

28. Exhibitors in the mid and high-power divisions must hold memberships in either NAR or Tripoli organizations.

29. The NAR High Power Rocket Safety Code applies to the construction and launching of all rockets displayed in this division. As such all mid and high-power. rocketry exhibitors must comply with the NAR High Power Rocket Safety Code that is in effect as of October 1st of the current 4-H year.

30. All rockets in the mid and high-power divisions are to be launched under adult supervision by the 4-H member who constructed the rocket.

31. For rockets launched using an engine(s) that have 160.1 ('H' engine or equivalent amount of smaller engines) Newton's-seconds or larger, adult supervision must be provided by an individual having at least a level 1 high power certification. The 4-H member should also hold or be attempting to attain their level 1 high power certification if launching on this large of an engine.

As defined by the National Association of Rocketry (NAR), a scale model is "any model rocket that is a true scale model of an existing or historical guided missile, rocket vehicle, or space vehicle, that has flown under rocket power." The intent of scale modeling is, according to the NAR, "is to produce an accurate, flying replica of a real rocket powered vehicle that is judged for craftsmanship in construction, finish, and flight performance." (NAR "Model Rocket Sporting Code" 52.1 <https://www.nar.org/contest-flying/competition-guide/>)

UNCREWED AERIAL SYSTEMS

The 4-H uncrewed aerial system or UAS project explores the world from above the trees and discovers new frontiers with UASs. UASs are commonly known as Uncrewed Aerial Vehicles (UAVs) or drones. Members explore the uses and applications of uncrewed aerial system including how UASs link to other projects such as geology, robotics, electronics, crop science and many more.

Rules:

1. The 4-H members must be currently enrolled in the 4-H project to exhibit in this division.

2. Each exhibitor may enter one exhibit per class. Exhibits must have been completed during the current 4-H year and have been selected at the county level for entry at the State Fair. Counties or district should select only top blue or purple ribbon exhibits which meet State Fair guidelines.

CONT. UNCREWED AERIAL SYSTEMS

3. The information that accompanies the UAS must be limited to the 4-H STEM Exhibit Information Form which is affixed to a 10" x 13" envelope. This envelope should NOT be attached to the UAS. This may be downloaded from <http://uas.engtech4ks.com/>. Any UAS exhibit not including this completed envelope will receive an automatic participation ribbon. All revisions of forms previously released for the STEM division dated prior to current year are void for use and new forms must be obtained and used that are dated by the Kansas State 4-H Office for the current year.
4. Each exhibit **MUST** include a video of the youth operating their UAS. This allows judges to get a better understanding of the exhibit and allows the youth the opportunity to fully demonstrate their exhibit. The video should be no longer than 8 minutes and should be placed on a USB drive or micro/SD card or, if desired, uploaded to YouTube as an unlisted video and a link to that video included in a file titled "VideoLink" or printed on a separate sheet of paper. These videos may also be considered for inclusion in a running video loop in the area at the State Fair after review by judges, chair(s) and extension staff. Adult guardians must complete Video Release included with the exhibit form. If the release is not completed the video will not be included in the video loop on display in the Engineering and Technology area of the Kansas State Fair.
5. Uncrewed aerial system exhibits may be checked out for use in a Kansas State Fair 4-H demonstration or 4-H illustrated talk with prior permission. For permission, check with the superintendent or the information desk in 4-H Centennial Hall. The exhibit must be returned to display immediately after the demonstration/illustrated talk or the exhibit will be disqualified.
6. Exhibitor's name, county or district, age, and years(s) in project must be tagged or labeled in a prominent location on the exhibit, educational display, notebook, and/or poster.
7. Uncrewed Aerial System that include or depict weaponry of any kind will be disqualified.
8. See the last section for full details about exhibiting posters, display boards and notebooks.
9. For scratch built UAS kits, If modifications are made to the exhibit a page should be attached noting those modifications.
10. If a safety violation is noted by the judges, superintendent, or other staff, the exhibitor's exhibit, at the judges' discretion, will receive a participation ribbon.
11. For practical application entries, the UAS is not required to be displayed as part of the exhibit, only the supporting material.
12. The same UAS may be used by multiple exhibitors for different practical application entries.

DO I NEED AN ENTRY CARD?

As a reminder, everything that is seen by a judge, or anything you get a ribbon for, or anything that you get a premium for, or anything that is published in the paper — needs to have an entry card filled out. The entry card is the only way that the computer knows that you exhibited something at the fair. **WHEN IN DOUBT – FILL ONE OUT!!**

WHAT IS AN EXHIBITOR NUMBER?

The exhibitor number is how the computer recognizes your name and club. Look in this fairbook for the exhibitor list to find your number. You will have the same number as long as you are in 4-H/FFA and in the same club. If you use somebody else's number – they will get the credit and money for the entry – not you. If you are in both 4-H and FFA you will have 2 numbers. If you want credit as a 4-H entry, use your 4-H number. If you want credit as an FFA entry, use your FFA number. Those interested in open class may get an exhibitor's number from the Extension Office.

WHY IS MY AGE WRONG ON THE LIST?

To make things more consistent across the state, we use your age as of January 1 of the current year (2025). You may be older than the list says, but for the purposes, we ask you to use the age as listed. If you think it's still wrong give us a call at the Extension Office.

ENTRY CARD QUESTIONS

Every item and event at the fair must have a pink entry card filled out prior to the fair. These cards are used to record your entry, placing and premium at the fair. Here are a few tips about filling out these important cards:

* **Attach the card to the exhibit or give to the superintendent.** For most entries, the cards can be attached to the exhibit. You may tape, staple, punch a hole, attach a string, or use any device you want to put it on your exhibit. Remember that the small part of the card stays with the exhibit and the large part the superintendent turns into the office. Make sure that the workers can write your placing on the card and that they can easily detach the large piece. For the livestock, showmanship, herdsmanship and style revue -- you give your cards to the person in charge -- since it's not too easy to staple a tag to your gold fish!!

* **Fill out both parts of the card.**

* **Do not tear the card apart. If it rips, just tape it back together.**
